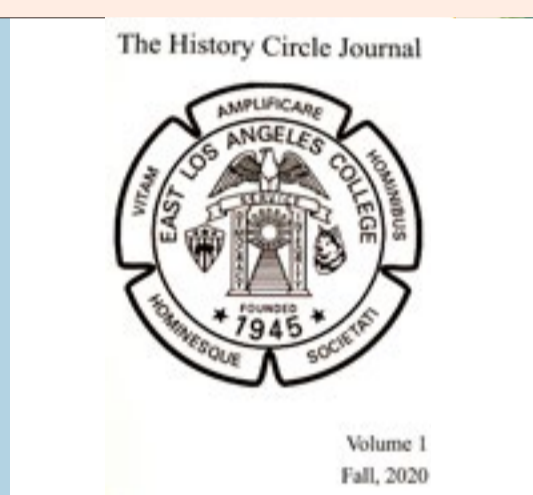
Social Sciences Newsletter

The History Journal invites faculty and district wide students to submit work that have historical and contemporary relevance. The History Circle Journal is preparing to launch the second edition in Fall 2021. The UCI Community College Honors Research Conference took place on March 26 and 27, 2021 during which ELAC student and History Circle Consul, Melany Bennett presented her research entitled, "Catalyst and Conquest: The Tectonics of Mexican Industrialization During the Porfiriato; 1876-1911." After visiting her hometown of Tampico, Mexico; Melany became intrigued by the dichotomy between the celebration of industrialization by the Mexican dictator Porfiriato Diaz and the negative repercussions of "progress" on the indigenous peoples.



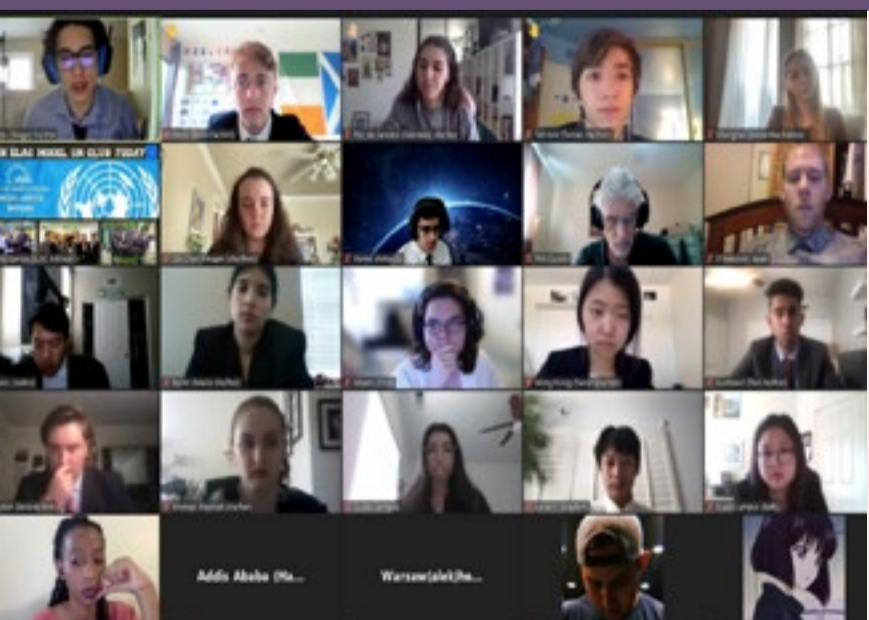
BUILD PODER

In collaboration with Cal State Northridge, Pasadena City College, and Valley College, Dr. Eileen Ie (Sociology) and Dr. Bryant Horowitz (Psychology) of East Los Angeles College have recently published an article titled, "BUILDing Equity in STEM: A Collaborative Undergraduate Research Program to Increase Achievement of Underrepresented Community College Students" in the journal of SPUR (Scholarship and Practice of Undergraduate Research). Dr. Ie and Dr. Horowitz serve as faculty mentors for California State University Northridge's undergraduate research program BUILD PODER. BUILD provides research opportunities to students in underserved communities in the areas of biomedical and social justice research, with an emphasis on equity and diversity. To date, 81 community college students and 41 unique community college faculty mentors have participated in BUILD PODER, performing research in a variety of STEM and biomedical disciplines.
