

APA Style Citations

This guide is a brief introduction to some of the most common types of citations using APA style. The rules of citing materials using APA style are developed by the American Psychological Association (APA). **For specific examples not included in this guide, please consult *The Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association*, 5th edition, 2001.** Copies of the APA Publication Manual are available in the reference stacks and at the reference office at the ELAC Library.

Citing Sources in the Text

You will need to document your paper throughout the text by citing the author and the date of the work you used in your research.

The proliferation of home VCRs meant that “by the mid-1980s features shot directly on video were the standard” (Thomas, 2001).

If you are citing a work by two authors, always reference both authors of the work you used in your research.

“Unlike metathesis of distinctive features may serve to weld together words etymologically unrelated but close in their sound and meaning” (Jacobson & Waugh, 1987).

If you are citing a work by more than two authors, cite all authors the first time the reference occurs. In subsequent citations, include the last name of the first author followed by “et al.”

Reference List (for Print Sources)

Each source that you cited in the text of your paper (like in the example above), must also appear in your reference list at the end of your paper. Type the word **References** (Reference, if there is only one) in uppercase and lowercase letters, centered at the top of the page. Double-space all reference entries. Entries that are more than one line long should have a hanging indent. Alphabetize all entries.

Citing a Book

Author's Last Name, First Initial. Middle Initial. (Year of publication). *Title of work, in italics*
(Xth ed.). Place of publication: Publisher.

Nash, G. (1997). *History on trial: Culture wars and the teaching of the past*. New York: Knopf.

Citing a Book with a Group Author or Government Agency

Group author (government agency). (Publication year). *Title* (edition – if there is one). Place of publication: Publisher. (When the author and publisher are identical, use the word Author as the name of the publisher.)

Australian Bureau of Statistics. (1991). *Estimated resident population by age and sex in statistical local areas. New South Wales, June 1990* (No. 3209.1). Canberra, Australian Capital Territory: Author.

Citing a Book with no Author or Editor

Title (Edition - if there is one). (Publication year). Place of publication: Publisher.

Merriam-Webster's collegiate dictionary (10th ed.). (1993). Springfield, MA: Merriam-Webster.

Citing a Book Chapter

Author's (of the entry) last name, Author's initial(s). (Publication year). Chapter title. In name of editor *Title of book* (pages). Place of publication: Publisher.

Baker, F. M., & Lightfoot, O. B. (1993). Psychiatric care of ethnic elders. In A. C. Gaw (Ed.), *Culture, ethnicity, and mental illness* (pp. 517-552). Washington, DC: American Psychiatric Press.

Citing an Encyclopedia Article

Author's (of the entry) last name, Author's initial(s). (Publication year). Entry title. In *Title of encyclopedia* (Volume number, pages). Place of publication: Publisher.

Sadie, S. (Ed.). (1980). *The new Grove dictionary of music and musicians* (6th ed., Vols. 1-20). London: Macmillan.

Citing a Newspaper Article with an Author

Author's Last Name, First Initial. Middle Initial. (Year, Month day of publication). Title of article. *Title of Newspaper in italics*, Section Page Number.

Carey, B. (2007, January 23). Do you believe in magic? *New York Times*, p. 1.

Citing a Newspaper Article, No Author

Title of article. (Year, Month day of publication). *Title of Newspaper in italics*, Section Page Number.

Capacity for exercise can help determine life span, study finds. (2002, March 14). *The New York Times* [National edition], p. A25

Citing a Magazine Article

Author's Last Name, First Initial. Middle Initial. (Year, Month day of publication). Title of article. *Title of Magazine in italics, volume number in italics* (issue number), page numbers.

Samuelson, R. J. (2004, January 5). A global glut of greenbacks. *Newsweek*, 143(2), 31, 35-36.

Citing a Journal Article

Author's Last Name, First Initial. Middle Initial. (Publication year). Title of article. *Title of Journal in italics, Volume Number in italics*, page numbers.

Klimoski, R., & Palmer, S. (1993). The ADA and the hiring process in organizations. *Consulting Psychology Journal: Practice and Research*, 45(2), 10-36.

Reference List (for Online Sources)

Citing an eBook from NetLibrary

Author's Last Name, First Initial. Middle Initial. (Year of Publication). *Title of the book in italics*. Place of Publication: Name of Publisher. Retrieved Month day, year, from Name of database.

Coltrain, S. (1996). *Family man: Fatherhood, housework, and gender equity*. New York: Oxford. Retrieved February 7, 2003, from NetLibrary database.

Citing a Scholarly Journal Article Accessed on an Electronic Database

Author's Last Name, First Initial. Middle Initial. (Publication year). Title of article. *Title of Journal in italics, volume number, page numbers.* Retrieved Month day, year, from Name of database.

Okon, K., Szumera, A., & Kuzniewski, M. (2003). Are CD34+ cells found in renal interstitial fibrosis? *American Journal of Nephrology*, 23(6), 409-14. Retrieved November 28, 2003, from ProQuest database.

Citing a Magazine Article Accessed on an Electronic Database

Author's Last Name, First Initial. Middle Initial. (Year, Month of publication). Title of article. *Title of Magazine in italics, Volume number (Issue number), page numbers.* Day Month Year of Publication: Page Numbers. Retrieved Month day, year, from Name of database.

Pace, A. K. (2003, October). Relative relevance. *Computers in Libraries*, 23(9), 35-37. Retrieved November 28, 2003, from ProQuest database.

Citing a Newspaper Article Accessed on an Electronic Database

Author's Last Name, First Initial. Middle Initial. (Year, Month day of publication). Title of article. *Title of the Newspaper italicized* (Edition, if given), Page numbers. Retrieved Month day, year, from Name of database.

Brody, J. E. (2007, February 20). Out of control: A true story of binge eating. *New York Times* (Late Edition (east Coast)), p. 7. Retrieved February 21, 2007, from ProQuest database.

Citing a Web Document, Web Page, or Report

Last Name, First Name of Author (if given). (Publication Date, if given). *Title of document or page, italicized.* Retrieved Month day, year, from <http://Web address>

Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation. (2004, February). *The role of media in childhood obesity.* Retrieved October 10, 2004, from <http://www.kff.org/entmedia/7030.cfm>

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
