

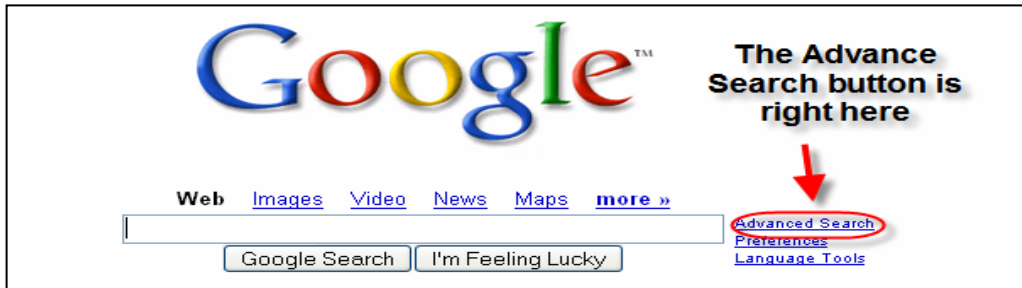

The Web has a lot to offer when it comes to research, but you can't trust everything you find on the Web. The following **criteria** can help you figure out if what you've found on the Web is useful for your research assignment or not:

Authority	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Who wrote the material? • Do you see contact information for the author? • Is the author an expert about this topic? • What can you find out about the author or organization? • Who is sponsoring the web site?
Accuracy	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • How complete and accurate are the information and the links provided? • Are most of the links working? • Does any of the information sound suspicious?
Objectivity	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Is any sort of bias evident? Does the site want you to accept their beliefs? • Does the site provide several points of view or only one? • Does the site reflect the agenda of a political, religious, or social group or institution?
Currency	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • For your topic, does it matter if the information on the web site is current? • When was the site produced? • When was it last updated? • How up to date are the links?
Content	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Who is the audience for the site? (e.g., third graders, college students, etc.) • What is the purpose of the Web Page & what does it contain? • What is the site's domain? • What is the relative value of the Web site in comparison to the range of information resources available on this topic? (Note: Be sure to check with a librarian.) <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ What other resources (print & non-print) are available in this area? ○ How comprehensive is this site?

Google is a great tool for searching the Web. However, the results you get back when you do a search using Google are not evaluated. Basically, they are ranked only according to popularity. This is why it's a good idea to do an advanced search on Google.



When you do an advanced search, think about limiting your results to domains that might provide the best information on your topic:

.edu	educational institutions
.gov	government sites
.org	non-profit organizations
.com	commercial sites
.net	also used by commercial sites
