Questions and Answers about returning to IN PERSON classes in Fall 2021 from students

How are you ensuring that the social distancing requirement will be met?

Social distancing requirements will be met by closing off gathering spaces and by maintaining a 50% capacity for all classrooms.

I'm wondering who will deal with non-compliant students?

In the classroom, the instructor will refer noncompliant students to the Dean of Students for further action. We will have security in place for any situation that goes beyond the scope of the instructor and the Dean. Will there be English classes for foreign students who want to learn English?

Yes. We will be offering 3 in person ESL classes in the Fall 2021.

If students choose to stay online for Fall 2021, can they still access all ELAC's resources?

Yes, all services will continue to be offered both remotely and in person.

I really liked being online and having everything on CANVAS. Will this continue with in person classes?

Will there be requirements set in place to visit campus?

The new procedure for visiting campus is to complete a self-check survey, which is available through the new ELAC Safety App that you can download, or at LACCD.edu.

Will we be required to get the vaccine before going back to in person classes?

No. We are not currently requiring students to have the vaccine before going back to in person classes, but we are highly recommending them and making the vaccines accessible to all.

How will ELAC observe COVID safety protocols to ensure that students, faculty, and the Monterey Park community remain safe as we are still in a pandemic?

ELAC as an institution must adhere to all LA County health guidelines to remain open, so this is at the top of our priorities for opening.

Will students be given a choice to take online classes if they do not feel comfortable going back to in person classes?

Yes. Both online and in person classes will be offered.

A lot of students have dropped out due to lack of either motivation or resources. Going back to campus gives a lot of us a fighting chance at graduating and continuing our education.

We are working on providing equitable access and opportunities for all community members who would like to return to in person learning.

How will they determine the number of students in a class?

This will be determined by classroom capacity, so if the capacity is 50, then only 25 individuals will be able to be inside the classroom (including the instructor and staff).

How do professors feel about returning to campus?

Many professors feel ready to come back to in person instruction, while many also have chosen to remain online for various reasons.

If classes are back on campus will seats have plexiglass or limit the number of students per class.

Because the Plexiglass is a recommendation for classes that require one-to-one interaction such as labs or one-to-one tutoring, only those spaces will have them available. Desks will be marked to stay 6 feet apart in the classroom.

I think it would be better to wait until Spring 2022. It feels like it's too soon to go back because there is limited data on how long vaccines can offer Instructors will have to option to continue to utilize CANVAS for in person classes since many have found it to be helpful, but it will be ultimately up to the instructor.

How many units will be required for international students when the school reopen during this pandemic?

International students need 12 units each semester. As of right now, brand new students coming to the U.S. in the fall need to take some form of in person/hybrid course which will be satisfied by one of our counseling classes.

Will we be able to have tutoring in person?

Yes. Tutoring will be offered with the proper social distancing requirements.

Will the cafeteria be opened?

No. Our cafeteria will be used as a classroom because of the space capacity.

How are you determining which classes will be in person?

Many classes that are considered "hard to convert" are already being offered on campus. The English department is offering classes that are in high demand to provide more options for students who would like to return.

If I decide to come back, how many students per class will there be?

There will be a 50% capacity; approximately 20 students per class, unless you are in a lecture hall, which has more capacity.

Will teachers be present, or will they be teaching via Zoom in class like other schools are doing?

In person classes will be taught by the instructor who will be there in the classroom.

Will the campus be cleansed and sanitized daily?

Yes. We have a robust custodial team that will clean and sanitize classrooms in-between classes. You will have disinfectant wipes available. They will also conduct deep cleanings in the evenings when classes are not in session.

Will it be hard to adapt back to face to face?

It could be difficult, and we are all adapting as we go, but we are working on creating a supportive environment for all students, faculty, and staff.

If we are looking to possibly return to in person lectures, how would it affect the availability or classes for students?

Because of the 50% capacity, there will be fewer classes available in person, but we will still offer several classes online.

We anticipate that we will be fully back to campus by Spring 2022, with a variety of classes still being offered online (with Zoom classes and with no Zoom classes).

When's the earliest/latest ELAC will fully open to the public?

We anticipate that we will be back to campus at a 50% capacity by Fall 2021.

I wonder if the shuttle will still be accessible to transport from the Southgate campus to the main campus.

Our Southgate campus will also return at a 50% capacity, but there will be no shuttle services.

What would classrooms look like?

Desks will be spaced out with markings for social distancing. There will be supplies available such as masks, disinfectant wipes, and face sheilds for students, faculty and staff.

Is it possible to do half of my classes online and half of my classes in person?

Yes. You may choose to take some classes online and others in person.

Will online classes and zoom be part of our college education from now on?

Yes. We are planning on offering more online classes and new online programs moving forward into the future.
