### DATA: MAKING THE CASE FOR EQUITY IN STEM

#### **FOREWORD FOR MILESTONE 2021**

Milestone and I have a very special relationship. I'm a poet, but I wasn't always. I was afraid, angry, and confused with no outlet and no focus. Milestone allowed me to speak, but more importantly, enabled me to hear my voice for the first time. I became a student at East Los Angeles College in 2010, a year after I graduated high school. My twin brother was bombarded with postcards from Ivy League schools, local powerhouses, and other highly regarded institutions. I, received gifts from the military. I found myself in a remedial math class in the winter of 2010—my last chance.

I bounced around between art, music, and architecture before I found, or rather, writing found me. I had no vision or idea of a future besides cleaning the grill at McDonald's and hanging drywall. But that grill was spotless and the drywall, perfect. Between jobs and between trying to navigate through whatever journey I was on, poetry was never far behind. Sleepless nights were accompanied by words I was too scared to ever speak, emotions that were more than shrugs, and reservations protecting what was fragile. It was time.

I dropped out of architecture and enrolled in a creative writing course taught by Susan Suntree in 2012. One assignment was to submit to Milestone. I had no idea what it was, and I definitely had no idea how much my life would change because of it.

I was published. Milestone 2013 published some work of mine.

I was never fortunate enough to meet Carol Lem, who was at the helm of Milestone for thirty years, and whose legacy remains as vibrant today as ever. Her successors, Joan Gurfield, Alexis Solis, Dolores Carlos, and Diane Mannone not only continued Milestone, they offered hope.

When asked to sign up for the release party/ reading for Milestone 2013, I immediately scoffed at the idea. I would never. But life is funny. A year later, I sauntered into Gurfield's office and sheepishly asked if it would be okay for me to read a poem that wasn't in the

journal. She was supportive, excited, and said yes. So, I began to write a poem—a poem that would become the most important piece of writing of my entire life.

Milestone provided me with an opportunity that was equally mystifying and humbling. It was never a dream of mine that I would be face to face with strangers as I screamed, cried, and shook. Yet somehow, on November 26, 2013, my entire life and my entire future converged into those few minutes on stage.

I knew after that moment Milestone had given me something precious, I just didn't quite know what it was.


Eight years ago, I walked onto a stage, and I write this now as the faculty advisor of Milestone with by all graces the opportunity to work with amazing minds and now call my former professors and mentors, colleagues. With a newfound perspective, and a student's heart, I carry hope that Milestone will give generations and generations of students what it had given me—a future.

Milestone 2021 is a collection of work that represents the ELAC community. Work by English majors, STEM majors, artists, engineers, faculty, and staff are forever bound within these pages just as we are all bound to ELAC. It represents the beauty and the ugliness of the Husky family as well as the tenacity and pride of all those who walk these halls.

So now, as people across the world begin to reintroduce themselves to one another, as we honor those we've lost, and as we look toward a brighter future, let us embrace the beauty of art; let us remember the power that we carry each and every day, and let us continue to build and grow our communities. Milestone has a historied past and its legacy thrives with each new class of students. Thank you to everyone who made this issue possible, and as with those who had come before and those to come after, start at ELAC, go anywhere.
